- Staffing adjustments for the Before-and-After-School Programs are determined by enrollment capacity, and both programs are currently operating at full capacity
- These programs have potential for growth with additional staffing.
- If the schools wish to add staffing, they need a Budget Amendment.

- Feedback on the school-managed programs indicates that parents feel more comfortable with them than when their children participated in the Before and After-Care Programs operated by Parks and Recreation
- Teacher participation in the program

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT
Jacquelin Collins, Superintendent

Superintendent Collins reported on the following:

- Lots of maintenance done over the holiday break
- Vent cleaning completed at OEN
- Hallway and Door painting, removal of chair rail at Middle School
- OES and OEN doors and hallways to be painted over Spring Break and Summer

- Carpet replacement for FY27 at OMS
- Looking to have that done at the High School
- Current student enrollment – 3,454 and wait list - 1,423
- Largest wait list – OES – approximately 600
- Strategies for continued matriculation levels; range from 95% to 99%
- Finalized Chapter 26, matriculation guaranteed K-12
- Upcoming years and the number of anticipated students
- Optimizing schedule and continued growth or keeping existing numbers
- Recommended forming a committee to include one board member, a finance representative, and a building maintenance representative to weigh our options so solutions may be presented for FY28
- Cost planning and analysis
- Portable classrooms as a potential solution
- All four schools have been deemed “Schools of Excellence” by ITEEA (International Technology and Engineering Educators Association) standards
- Conferences for staff to obtain new teaching tools
- Counselors going to Harvard Medical School for student mental health topics
- Staff going to various conferences for AI Education and Learning
- Accreditation process is extensive and time consuming
- Strategic goals of Community Engagement involve student numbers and the goal of the website being ADA Compliant by April 2026
- Drama students will be doing skits at Drug House Odyssey by Drug Free Lee County and Lee Health

Discussion held regarding:

- Attending conferences to garner knowledge which can be shared with staff and students
- Current enrollment and wait listed students and historical data
- Enrollment exploded over the last two years; students get in and stay in the schools
- Accepting sibling students is becoming an issue
- Accommodating wait list students would require another K-8 school
- High Schools are on a block schedule as needed to teach course load
- Mental health conference and sharing strategies
- Learning and Brain Conference focuses on AI and is presented by the researchers
- Explanation of Drug Odyssey House goals, drama class does skits for the program, grant related through the County, no cost to the school

Member Katine offered to serve on the “Looking Forward” Committee.

Vice Chair Atisele inquired about the Cognia Certification.

Superintendent Collins explained it was an information gathering process and the timeline.

Chair Jackson asked about culinary department overhaul/updating.

OHS Principal Corey responded there was an incredible grant opportunity started last year; architect working on the final plans.

Chair Jackson asked about the AI Certificate. He suggested partnering with FGCU and mentioned Dr. Minaya was working on a program for them.

OHS Principal Corey responded she would contact the STEM Director to see what opportunities there may be.

Member Kilraine commented:

- High quality and wonderful programs at OHS
- Would be willing to work on the future committee

Member Michaels commented:

- Congratulated Principal Corey on the school accomplishments
- Social media – morning tardiness – because of the Middle School Dropoff

OHS Principal Corey responded she would look into this.

Member Katine commented:

- Gains in English and History
- Questioned if outside resources for that such as student teachers could enrich the program or tutor

OHS Principal Corey responded tutoring is offered every Tuesday and Thursday after school, and if she could find math tutors, it would be great.

Discussion held regarding:

- About a third graduate with ACE diploma
- Cambridge program is based on junior year and not senior year
- Teachers will open their classrooms so other teachers can actually view the teaching strategies
- Two floating teachers
- Achievements of the families and the system working together

OHS Parent Representative Heuglin recognized Principal Corey for her accomplishments.

Discussion continued:

- Classroom size
- Rule about dual enrollment that may increase capacity
- Cambridge Program and dual enrollment – a student can earn their A.A. degree before they get their High School Diploma

Vice Chair Atisele commented:

- Principal Corey has done an amazing job
- Open House filled with parents and students
- Culinary Students

Chair Jackson commented:

- Great presentation, the culture is the reason

OHS Principal Corey concluded with:

- Our High School Basketball Team has only lost one game and invited all to attend Thursday night at 7:00 p.m.

Chair Jackson commented:

- High performing Charter School - Student retention is high
- Replicate the success process and provide it to Lee County per State Statute
- With 1,423 students waiting, the experience needs to be shared
- Need to come up with a committee and have outside of the box ideas
- Limiting the enrollment is an option but that is not desirable
- Could go to portable classrooms; however, they do not traditionally work out due to a cohesive student body disconnect
- Brick and mortar – extremely expensive
- School of Hope – utilize unused space of other schools
- These items should be considered
- Need to get started with brainstorming options to be presented to the Board
- Endorsed Member Kilraine to be on that committee
- Also welcomed Member Katine to be on that committee as well

Assistant City Attorney Moriarty noted it would need to be one member; notice the meeting; follow the Sunshine Law. The preference would be having a public meeting.

OHS Parent Representative Heuglin wanted to add an OHS teacher/staff member included in the process.

Member Katine agreed about having a high school staff member included but open it up to the middle and elementary schools.

Superintendent Collins commented:

- Committees are best when there is a high-level small group versus opening everything up to everyone.
- Presenting can be done with more but the committee should be smaller

Chair Jackson noted it was more important to have a cohesive committee of high-level people.

Member Katine agreed the smaller the better but the other opinions could be beneficial.

Vice Chair Atisele was in favor of both members Kilraine and Katine.

Member Michaels commented:

- Any potential solutions are 100% inhibited by budget
- She offered to be the Committee Member since she is on the Finance Committee.

Member Kilraine stated he could be a liaison and not an actual member. He suggested putting it on the next agenda.

Chair Jackson noted it will go on the next meeting agenda and choose a Chair.

Assistant City Attorney Moriarty explained:

- That is not traditional – typically it is a committee formed, and the Chair is nominated by the committee
- So, decide at the next meeting which option would be chosen
- Sunshine Law – two or more members
- Does not apply if only one member is in attendance
- Cannot be just a fact-finding committee

Chair Jackson noted there would be further discussion at the next meeting to decide how to organize the Committee. ***There were no objections.***

A RESOLUTION OF THE CAPE CORAL CHARTER SCHOOL AUTHORITY GOVERNING BOARD OF THE CITY OF CAPE CORAL, FLORIDA, ACKNOWLEDGING THE STATUS OF CERTAIN INSTRUCTIONAL PERSONNEL AND THE NOTICE REQUIRED TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS AS SET FORTH IN SECTION 1012.42 OF THE FLORIDA STATUTES; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Section 1012.42 of the Florida Statutes requires that all schools annually notify parents when a teacher is assigned teaching duties in a class outside the field in which the teacher is certified; and

WHEREAS, out-of-field assignments may occur for a variety of reasons, including teacher expertise in related subject area, evolving instructional needs, and the complex certification requirements in certain disciplines; and

WHEREAS, certain teachers at Oasis Charter Schools may be teaching out-of-field subject areas, in which they have not yet completed the full state certification requirements, including certification in areas such as English for Speakers of Other Languages, Exceptional Student Education, and Reading, however teachers are actively pursuing the necessary coursework and professional development to achieve the appropriate certification.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CAPE CORAL CHARTER SCHOOL GOVERNING BOARD OF THE CITY OF CAPE CORAL, FLORIDA:

Section 1. The Cape Coral Charter School Authority Governing Board of the City of Cape Coral, Florida, hereby acknowledges the certification status of certain instructional personnel and the requirement as set forth in Section 1012.42 of the Florida Statutes, which requires notification to parents and guardians regarding the out-of-field teaching assignments.

Section 2. The Cape Coral Charter School Authority Governing Board of the City of Cape Coral, Florida, hereby directs the Superintendent to provide the appropriate notifications are distributed in a timely manner, in accordance with state law and school policy.

Section 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
